                                                     This is a
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    request, special land use, to put a used vehicle sales and
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    accessory auto service at 24260 Telegraph Road, zoned I-1 in the
    front, the rear 75 feet is zoned P for vehicular parking.
24
              Previously, it was a small machine shop, prototyping
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machine shop, been for many, many, many years. They are
proposing some substantial improvements to the site and dressing
up of the building.

The site plan would be -- because this is industrially zoned, the site plan will be administratively approved by the city planner, so this is just the special land use. You'd be making a recommendation to Council, and then it would go to Council next month.

As noted here, the zoning on the site is I-1, general industrial in the front, and then has a rear strip of parking where it abuts the residential, that area is actually mostly landscaping, presently, and in the current plan. It is in the Southfield technology corridor.

This is the site as it is now. As you can see, mostly dirt and gravel, a little bit of a kind of wooded area in the rear. Buildings. It's been around for a long time. This is as the building looks today. As you can see, the gravel off the parking lot into the rear, there's a fence.

This is the proposed site plan. This revision came in today, so it won't match exactly what's in your packet because they took care of a couple of issues. They've now pulled a couple of parking spaces off of that front to keep that driveway 22 feet wide all the way to the curb, because 22 foot's our minimum two-way traffic. It had been staked down to 16, but that was a problem for two-way traffic.

So you'll now see there's like one parallel spot up in that front area, where there used to be parking running all the way down. The other problem with that angle parking that was all the way down is they would have been backing onto the sidewalk, which is no good. So we -- we asked them to remove that.

They have moved the ADA spaces from the last version you saw over front of the building, because the public entrance is across there, where you see the striped walk. So that was a change that was made. And then you've got the landscape area in the back is now kind of better defined, and they put the shrubs and trees in the front.

So -- and we got the dumpster enclosure reconfigured. Now the garbage truck can pull in straight and then do a T turnaround to exit, which will work for the radiuses. So that's -- we went back and forth a couple of times. We got this refined. The only thing that needs to be fixed on this, and we can do it in the admin site plan review, is, you'll notice that walk that goes out to the sidewalk, kind of where the ADA ramp thing is, it goes to the front door.

There's a couple of shrubs shown in there. Those will have to be shifted because that's going to be a walkway. So that's the only defect in that plan, but that'll be added to the administrative site plan and we'll -- we'll get that straightened out. I've already talked to the applicant about

1 it. This is the floor plan. Much as you saw before, they did provide us an image -- the specifications and an image of the lift to clarify what kind of lift it was. It will -- it's one of those vehicles, ones that comes in, like, with a fork and lifts the whole vehicle up off the ground. So that is the -the model of lift they're putting into the building, as you see up in the top right. The picture that was on the plan was a little small, so I actually looked up the manufacturer's spec and got a better 10 11 photo to put in here for your -- for clarity. This is just the 12 elevations of the building as it'll be revised, and then we do 13 have elevations. As you can see, cultured stone on the front, 14 some new windows, wraparound awning. Got some fencing there 15 that's to secure the rear part of the property when they're not 16 open. 17 And the petitioner is present, if they'd please come 18 forward. 19 THE PETITIONER: Good evening, ladies and gentlemen. My name is Mike Sema (phonetic) of 400 Monroe, Suite 240, 20 21 Detroit, Michigan. 22 THE CHAIRMAN: Anything additional you'd like to add 23 about the project, go ahead. 24 THE PETITIONER: Yes. So when we are over here, we're trying to -- to -- for dealership, and we are over here, we --25

the last time we were -- I was over here, there were some 1 storage carts in the location. After the -- the meeting, I went over there and made sure everything was removed again to clean it up. So there's nothing left in that place because they was using it for storage and some that -- (indiscernible) have access, so we took care of all that now. And at the same time, we did some modification to the blueprint, whatever needed for all the -- the parking, the --9 about 12 parking just for the sales cars, seven car for customers, three for employees. And we have dumpster in the 10 back of the location. 11 12 So -- and we're only doing accessory. We don't do any 13 work for anybody else. If -- if we do any work, that's going to 14 be only for our cars when we get it from the auction. And we work with a lot of late model cars over here. 16 THE CHAIRMAN: Okay. All right. 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    residence. They want to upgrade that to a group childcare home,
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    which allows up to 12 children to be under care at one time,
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    requires a state license and requires a special land use.

              So they are looking at hours Monday through Thursday.
24
    Eventually, we had some discussion, and she hopes to grow to
    these hours. So I said, well, that's what we'll put for the
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condition, if you want to grow to these hours, Monday through 1 Thursday, 8:30 to 4:00; Friday, 8:30 to 2:00. As I said, she has been operating for a number of years as a family daycare home. We haven't really -- I looked through the code enforcement cases and everything, I couldn't find any records of any issues. As looking at the property, it is on Maryland Street. It's all R-3, residential zoning, single family homes. The master plan is a moderate density, single family. That's all very consistent. This is a aerial photo recent of the -- of the 10 11 property. You see it's a ranch house, shallow backyard, 12 driveway, pretty standard configuration. Curb area, well kept 13 house. 14 This is the basement floor plan, which is where the 15 daycare is at. The -- as we discussed last time, they do have 16 stairs and a egress window. So they have two means of egress, which is a requirement. We do have a photo showing the space 17 18 now as it is configured, that the applicant provided, and I believe the petitioner's present if they would come forward. 19 20 THE CHAIRMAN: State your name and address, please, 21 for the record, and anything you'd like to add. 22 MS. PIERCE: Sure. My name is Abigail Pierce, 24749 23 Maryland Street. The children I care for fondly call me Mora 24 Abigail. Mora, in Hebrew, means teacher. I want to start by thanking everyone from the City 25

- Planning Department for getting us this far. I'm here tonight
  to request approval for a special land use permit which allows
  me to use my home to take care of six additional children in the
  Southfield community.
- This is not a -- just a job for me, it's my calling.

  I grew up in a family that ran, and still runs, a home-base

  childcare. So caring for children has always been part of who I

  am. For the past 19 years, I've worked in early childhood

  education, and since 2016, I've operated a fully-licensed home

  daycare right here in my Southfield home.

- I have a bachelor's degree in education, and I'm proud to share that my program has earned and maintained a five-star rating, the highest possible, under the Michigan's Great Start to Quality Education. My goal is simple, to provide children with a warm, nurturing environment where they feel safe, loved, and excited to learn.
- I believe every child is a unique, precious gift, and I do everything I can to help them shine socially, emotionally, and developmentally. There's something truly special and calming about growing up in a childcare home setting, and many parents choose me for this exact reason.
- If approved, this expansion will allow me to serve more families. Around 90 percent of the families whom I serve live right here in Southfield. I would create another full-time job, hiring an assistant teacher to work with me.

Our home is City-inspected, up to code, and includes 1 safety features that exceed residential requirements. I'm CPR 2 and first state certified. I complete 10 continuous educational hours annually, and state childcare regulation ensure all staff and family members are background checked and fingerprinted. I want to acknowledge an important concern, traffic. 6 My hours of operation do not overlap with morning rush hour, and drop off and pickup is usually staggered. I take -- I take 8 being a good neighbor seriously, and I've spoken with our immediate neighbors, many of whom are here tonight to show their 10 11 support. This expansion would allow me to give more to the 12 community while keeping our warm host base setting intact. Thank you for considering my request and for your 13 14 continued support in early education in Southfield. 15 THE CHAIRMAN: All right. Thank you. This is a 16 public hearing. I'm going to ask you to take a brief step back. And then it'll go to Council for final ruling 14 on that. 15 Next item up, the DIA partners and public art mural 16 relocation, which was going to be on the side of the ice arena by where the pool is because they're going to build a new pool. 17 18 We had to move that because we didn't want to put it on a building that might be substantially modified shortly, so 19 20 we got approval of the Council to relocate to that -- to the front of the Arts and Craft Museum -- or Arts AND Crafts 21 22 building, which is that little building that's right next to the 23 tennis courts. You know where that little turnoff is, that 24 faces -- it's a pretty visible spot. We're going to kind of move the sign and redo the 25

landscaping a little bit to make it more visible, but there'll 1 be a mural coming to that surface soon, done by a Detroit muralist called Backpack, who's pretty well known. 27301 West 11 Mile ODD rezoning was approved. They've got to get enacted at the next regular meeting later this next month, and then that'll be official. So they're going to get their additional uses so they can backfill that property a 8 little better, and also just kind of make it suit its physical characteristics. 9 It's very odd to me that it was ever zoned B-2, but 10 11 apparently it was built under B-2, which is strange, given how 12 it's actually configured. But, you know, stuff happened in the 13 past. Anyway. 14 Flag pole height zoning -- height zoning text 15 amendment was approved. That one will be enacted at the end of 16 the next month. And then the office uses in the B districts, 17 that zoning amendment was enacted, so that's -- it's going to be 18 published August 7th, and then that'll be effective. That 19 allows the office uses in the B-1, the B-2 and B-3, so you won't 20 see any more of those special land use requests for these small 21 office uses to go into these commercial buildings because it'll 22 now be permitted, which should save us all a -- a bit of grief
