Friends of Southfield Public Arts hosts Art & Vintage Fashion Show on May 31st

These labels and more will be on display at the Art & Vintage Couture Fashion Show to be held at the Skyline Club (2000 Southfield Town Center, 28th Floor) on Friday, May 31 from 7 to 9pm.

The event is a fundraiser for the Friends of Southfield Public Arts. Presale tickets are \$50; day of event, \$60. Besides the fashion show, the event will feature art, jewelry, and clothing vendors. A deejay and wine and cheese reception are included.

Eleven models from the Southfield A&T Dance Team will sport over 40 articles of vintage clothing from the 1940s, '50s, '60s, and '70s. The couture is on loan from Fantoni, the Berkley vintage clothing store located at 4105 W. Twelve Mile Road.

TOUR HIGHLIGHTS

The Southfield Mid-Century Modern Tour includes interior visits to five buildings and one home. A Home & Building Guide is included.

The tour will proceed from Shaarey Zedek to a classic Mid-Century home, with its original interior décor, to Cranbrook Neighborhood and on to significant buildings along Southfield Road (including Empowerment Church) and Northwestern Highway.

The tour will loop around Northland with several stops including Minoru Yamasaki's Reynolds Aluminum building and through Northland Gardens to Ira Kaufman Funeral Home and Emanuel Lutheran Church.

Southfield to Showcase its Mid-Century Modern Architecture with City Tour on Sunday, June 9

In celebration of some of its unique architecture and designs by several of the 20th Century's leading architects, the Southfield Historical Society, the Detroit Area Art Deco Society, and the Friends of Southfield Public Arts are hosting once again the Southfield Mid-Century Modern Architecture Tour.

The bus tour will begin at 2pm on Sunday, June 9 at Shaarey Zedek Synagogue, 27375 Bell Road at 11 Mile Road. Free parking is available at the site. The bus will return to Shaarey Zedek at approximately 4:40pm.

Mid-Twentieth Century architecture and design (referred to as Mid-Century Modern) has seen a tremendous resurgence in the popularity. Mid-Century Modern styling is popular once again in architecture, fashion, home furnishings, and interior design.

For a number of years during the 1960s Southfield was Michigan's fastest growing city. As a result, Southfield has a large, amazing collection of Mid-Century Modern homes, commercial buildings, schools, and religious institutions.

The purpose of the tour is to create awareness of and appreciation for some of Southfield's distinctive buildings and homes and to promote Southfield as a place to live, recreate, and do business. Guides will comment on some the distinctive features of Mid-Century Modern architecture as well as architects of the day. Besides Yamasaki, other noted buildings in the city were designed by Victor Gruen, Gunnar Birkerts, Rossetti & Associates, Percival Goodman, G. Bruce Boore, and Louis Redstone.

June 10 – Flag Raising & Council Presentation

Southfield's Juneteenth celebration will kick off with the raising of the Juneteenth flag at 5:30pm at the circle drive in front of City Hall, followed by the reading of the City Council Juneteenth proclamation at 6pm.

June 12 –Jazz & Blues at the Library – 6pm

The Friends of the Southfield Public Library will sponsor a special Juneteenth Jazz & Blues concert on the Library Fountain Terrace. This free concert will feature the music of the One Luv Band, a dynamic, high-energy group that will inspire attendees to clap their hands and move their feet.

June 14 – Senior Luncheon –11:30am – 1pm

Southfield Parks and Recreation will host a special Juneteenth Senior Luncheon in Room 115 Parks & Recreation Building. Includes a hot meal, music, dance, and speeches that highlight the significance of Juneteenth. Tickets are \$25 for residents and \$30 for non-residents. Pre-registration required through Parks& Rec. June 15 - Mayor's Juneteenth Walk -10-11:30am

Join Mayor Ken Siver for the Mayor's annual Juneteenth Walk on Saturday, June 15 from 10-11:30am beginning at the Southfield City Hall front circle. Mayor Siver will lead participants on an invigorating 2.5 mile walk concluding a stop at the Covenant Church linked to the Underground Railroad.

June 16 – Juneteenth Jubilee – 4-9pm

Southfield Parks & Recreation will host Juneteenth Jubilee, a special Juneteenth celebration on the Municipal Campus front lawn. Included are food trucks, entertainment for the entire evening, yard games, a marketplace with over 30 Black vendors, and a beer and wine tent for attendees ages 21 and over.

June 18 – Southfield Historical Society Profiles in Freedom – 6pm

Members of the Southfield Historical Society will profile African American freedom fighters at the barn behind the Mary Thompson House on Evergreen Road. The event will feature period costumes.

Spring is Here! Plant Flowers that Deer (usually) Won't Eat

Many residents are frustrated by marauding deer eating their flowers and shrubs. Deer are picky eaters when there is plenty of vegetation to choose from. (They will eat just about anything if hungry enough in late fall, winter, or early spring.)

Deer do not like plants with fuzzy leaves or that give off a stronger odor. You can have flowering annuals and perennials in your yard if you choose deer adverse plants.

17th Annual Southfield Garden Walk Slated for Sunday, June 23 - 2-5pm

The Southfield Parks & Garden Club will hold its 17th Annual Garden Walk on Sunday, June 23 from 2-5pm. The walk will feature 11 yards in the Tamarack/Hiawatha Neighborhood, bounded Evergreen and Lahser roads, south of Ten Mile. Enter the neighborhood on Tamarack Trail.

Garden Walk tickets are \$10 and may be purchased on the day of the event or from the Southfield Mayor's Office. The Garden Walk starts at the corner of Tamarack Trail and Tamarack Circle. Parking is free, as are refreshments.

Tamarack/Hiawatha is a lovely, wooded neighborhood of Mid-Century ranch homes. Attendees are encouraged to walk the loop through the neighborhood. However, a shuttle bus will make a continuous loop. Yards on display are clustered in several areas.

The Southfield Parks & Garden Club originated the annual walk to showcase some of Southfield's beautiful and unique home gardens and garden art, to offer tips and ideas to homeowners, provide information on annuals, perennials, shrubs, and trees and to promote Southfield's housing stock.

The club maintains the community garden at Emanuel Lutheran Church, growing vegetables for Forgotten Harvest.

2024 Road Repair Projects Underway

As flowers bloom and trees bud, out come the orange barrels marking another road construction season.

Southfield will be spending \$21 million, about half of it grant funded, this season on roads and pathways. Projects include:

- 12 Mile Telegraph to Northwestern
- Code House Neighborhood
- Foster Winter Drive
- North Park Drive
- Nine Mile Evergreen to Lahser
- Sherwood Village West
- Ten Mile Greenfield to Evergreen Spot Repair
- Beech Road Pathway Nine Mile to Shiawassee
- Nine Mile Pathway Prescott to Lahser
- Repaving Civic Center Pathway

In addition, numerous water main and sewer replacement projects are scheduled, including the redesign of underground lift stations and water main lining and replacement, totaling \$23.04 million.
