





Early Voting available in Southfield this November!

Early voting for all Southfield precincts will be available in the Southfield Parks & Recreation Room 115 from October 26 — November 3, 2024 from 8:30 a.m. — 4:30 p.m. (except Thursday, October 31, 2024 from noon — 8 p.m.) Early voting will also be available for all Southfield precincts at Oakland County's regional site: Waterford Oaks Activity Center, 2800 Watkins Lake Road in Waterford.

What is Early Voting?

Early voting allows a voter to cast a ballot in person before Election Day in an experience similar to voting on Election Day. During the early voting period, voters are issued a ballot that they can insert directly into a tabulator at their early voting site or they can bring their absentee ballot to run through the tabulator.

Who can vote early?

Any registered voter in Michigan has the right to vote early in person at an early voting site for statewide and federal elections in which they are eligible. Voters in Michigan can register to vote up to and on Election Day, including during the early voting period.

Priority Waste selected as City's new garbage and recycling vendor

GFL Environmental, the City's previous refuse collection vendor was sold to Priority Waste effective July 1, 2024. Priority Waste will continue to pick up garbage and recycling on residents' designated days; however, there may be some fluctuation in pick up times. All other rules for curbside collection will remain the same:

- Place trash at the curb after 4 p.m. on the afternoon before scheduled pick-up and no later than 7 a.m. the day of your scheduled pick-up.
- Place trash can (or other garbage and recycling) at curb on your property (not in street if possible) in proper position with lid opening facing towards the street

according to the directions imprinted on trash cans.

 Yard waste must be in approved paper yard waste bags or containers (32-gallon max) clearly marked with a yard waste sticker. Yard waste in plastic bags will not be collected.

The sale included all of GFL's trucks and other equipment as well as the transfer of contracts with 75 other municipalities. Residents may see the lime green GFL trucks for a period until they are all painted yellow and rebranded as Priority Waste trucks.

New Priority Waste Garbage Carts being delivered to all Southfield single-family households!

As part of the new contract with Priority Waste, all single-family households will receive a new garbage cart delivered directly to their home free of cost.

Every household (excluding apartments and condominiums) will receive one 95-Gallon Southfield-branded trash cart with a hinged lid and wheels for easy mobility. The carts are black with red lids.

At present, the new carts are not required and residents can still use their own trash cans; however, they cannot be more than 32-gallons or weigh more than 60 lbs. as those cans must be manually placed into the truck.

How to order 64-Gallon recycling cart If you don't already have one?

Residents should contact Priority Waste at (586) 228-1200 or visit www.prioritywaste.com to order a free 64-gallon recycling cart delivered directly to their home. Recycling carts are only provided upon request at no





cost to single-family households (excluding apartments and condominiums) who have not already previously received one. Those residents who have already received the red 64-gallon recycling cart may continue to use them and do not need to order a new one.

Household Hazardous Waste Day October 26

RRRASOC will host a Household Hazardous Waste Day Event on October 26 at the RRRASOC MRF- Truck Entrance, 20875 Mapleridge Avenue, Southfield. Residents of any RRRASOC community (including all Southfield residents) can attend any of the Household Hazardous Waste Day events.

Household hazardous waste consists of products used in and around the home that can be Corrosive, Toxic, Flammable or Reactive. Check the label to determine if products require special handling for disposal. Household hazardous waste must be collected through licensed hazardous waste companies. Residents are encouraged to bring household hazardous waste to a special drop-off event or collection site.

Electronic waste is also accepted at all Household Hazardous Waste Day events. The mobile shredder will also be onsite as well. Residents may bring up to 3 boxes or 100 pounds of paper for shredding.

Southfield Parks continue to improve with recent upgrades

Over the past decade, outdoor spaces have become increasingly vital to city residents, prompting the Southfield Parks & Recreation Department to enhance the city's parks. This summer marked the completion of a major renovation at Carpenter Lake Nature Preserve and the start of two exciting projects at Lahser Woods Park and Beech Woods Park.

Carpenter Lake Nature Preserve recently underwent significant upgrades. This 42-acre preserve, established in 2007, provides a haven for local wildlife and a serene space for visitors.

Thanks to a \$600,000 Michigan Economic Development Grant, secured by State Senator Jeremy Moss and State Representative Jason Hoskins, the city was able to expand the preserve's amenities. Key improvements include the addition of 25 parking spaces (now totaling 71, with accessible spots and bus parking), a small open-air shelter, and an all-season restroom facility. ADA accessibility features were also incorporated, such as curb ramps and a crosswalk connecting the Boulder Garden to the restroom and shelter area. These enhancements will support a wide array of nature programs for all ages.

Unfortunately, just before the official reopening of the park, a tree fell and damaged the fishing pier. Repairs, which will also improve wheelchair accessibility at the pier, are planned for this fall.

Lahser Woods Park Another exciting development is taking shape at Lahser Woods Park, where a newly paved pathway connects the neighborhood to the Young Israel



of Southfield synagogue, Stevenson Elementary School, and Lahser Road. This marks the first phase of a project that will transform the park into Southfield's first dog park, further expanding recreational opportunities for residents and their pets.

Beech Woods Park, a new pathway now links the Nine Mile Road sidewalk to the park, offering easy access to the picnic shelter and playground. Additionally, construction has begun on a \$7 million renovation project. The plan includes a redesigned entrance, parking lot, playlot, restroom facility, picnic shelter, and the replacement of the old maintenance building. These improvements will create a modernized park space, enhancing the overall experience for park visitors.

Additional Projects Other recent efforts include fence replacement at the Mary Thompson House and Farm. Bedford Woods Park received attention on August 22, when volunteers from the local business community and LTU completed improvements such as pathway maintenance, fence cleanup, playground mulch installation, and a mural project.

These projects reflect Southfield's ongoing commitment to providing top-quality outdoor spaces for its residents. Keep an eye on these parks as they continue to evolve!

"Southfield Solutions" app and "Eyes on Southfield" hotline help to keep Southfield beautiful

Southfield Solutions App and Web Reporting Platform

The City of Southfield partnered with QScend Technologies to launch the Southfield Solutions platform that allows residents to directly report quality-of-life issues and request city services all from the convenience of their smart phone, tablet or computer. With the free Southfield Solutions mobile app and web tools, Southfield residents and businesses can provide City of Southfield staff with photographs, specific descriptions, geo-locating and more — valuable information needed to resolve an issue efficiently. In addition, the Southfield Solutions platform provides Southfield officials with a centralized issue management system to manage issues from the initial report to resolution — engaging the community throughout the process.

The Southfield Solutions mobile app is available for free. Search for "Southfield Solutions" in the Apple App Store or Google Play Store. In addition to the mobile apps, citizens can send reports directly to the City of Southfield website at www.cityofsouthfield.com.

Eyes on Southfield Community Appearance Hotline

The City of Southfield launched the "Eyes on Southfield" program to enable residents to notify the City with ease when a code or blight issue is observed. Residents may simply call (248) 796-EYES (3937) 24 hours-a-day, seven days-a-week to report code issues or violations. With an



increased focus on curb appeal, the Southfield Code Enforcement Department will respond to most complaints within a 24- to 48-hour time period. Code Enforcement Officers canvass the City seven days-a-week to monitor the condition of Southfield homes and neighborhoods. In addition, the City relies on the "eyes and ears" of the entire community to report any obvious or extreme code violations. When a violation exists, code officers will inform the resident or business of the issue and educate them on how to correct it. If another violation occurs at the same property, the home or business owner will be issued a civil infraction and must appear in court.

Southfield residents are encouraged to report potential code or blight issues through the Southfield Solutions app or by calling the City's special "Eyes on Southfield" hotline, (248) 796-EYES (3937). Together, we can keep Southfield beautiful!

Sustainable Southfield Initiative receives honorable mention in U.S. Conference of Mayor's 2024 Climate Protection Awards

The City of Southfield's Sustainable Southfield Initiative recently received honorable mention in U.S. Conference of Mayor's 2024 Climate Protection Awards! As the effects of climate change becomes more impactful on cities throughout the nation and the world, thirteen U.S. mayors were recognized today for their outstanding leadership in combatting these changes, each winning a 2024 Mayors' Climate Protection Award.

This is the 18th class of mayors to be honored by The U.S. Conference of Mayors (USCM) for local actions that reduce carbon use and emissions in their cities.

These annual mayoral awards are supported through a partnership between USCM and Walmart, specifically recognizing innovative "local climate action" by mayors throughout the United States.

The City of Southfield announced the winner of the 2024 Southfield Photo Prize at an awards reception on Thursday, September 19 in Council Chambers.

The City of Southfield sponsored the 8th annual Southfield Photo Prize competition and outdoor exhibition this past summer to showcase the natural and architectural beauty throughout the city. A total of 159 submissions were received and initially reviewed by the Total Living Commission which selected the top 25 photos that were eligible for public voting from July I – September I. The Photo Prize finalists were enlarged and placed on public display at the parks & recreation building with online voting at www.cityofsouthfield.com. Over 3,750 unique votes were cast in the contest. The results were determined by the most overall online votes each finalist received.


Stay Safe with these Winter Home Safety Tips from the Fire Department

As the leaves are changing colors and the air is getting cooler, the Southfield Fire Department would like to share a few safety tips before we see snow on the ground.

- Make sure that your furnace is working properly. Check the filter, and make sure you don't have anything that can burn within 3 feet of the furnace.
- If you use a space heater in your home or office, make sure there is nothing that can burn within 3 feet of the space heater. Make sure the space heater automatically shuts-off if it is tipped over. Do not leave the space heater on when you leave the room or go to bed, and make sure it is plugged directly into the wall outlet.
- Never use your oven to heat your home or apartment.
- Do not leave the kitchen when you are cooking and be extra careful when frying foods. The oil can heat up quickly and there are a lot of distractions when there are extra people in your home. Do not use water on a grease fire; put a lid on it instead. If there is a fire in the oven or the microwave, keep the door closed. Turn off the oven and unplug the microwave.
- Never leave candles unattended and make sure there is nothing that will burn within I ft. of the candle.



- Do not use candles as emergency lighting. A flashlight is a much better choice.
- Be careful of the placement of Christmas Trees.
 Make sure you have at least 3 feet of clearance from
 an ignition source such as a fireplace or space heater.
 Most importantly, do not forget to water your tree
 every day.
- Make sure you have working smoke alarms and working carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your house and test them monthly. There should be a smoke alarm in each bedroom, and each level of your home should have a smoke alarm and a CO alarm.









Prepare your home for fall and winter

Fall is the time when you want to get your home and yard ready for the winter cold. Follow these easy steps, most of which you can do yourself, to help lower your utility bills and protect your property.

Home Preparation Steps

- Tune-up your furnace for optimal performance. Get your chimney, furnace and heating ducts inspected and winterize the A/C. regularly replace furnace filters and check smoke and carbon monoxide detector batteries.
- Clean out gutters and downspouts, disconnect and drain all outside hoses. If possible, shut off outside water valves.
- Repair roof leaks and prune any tree branches that could become weighted down with ice or snow and fall on your house or your neighbor's house.
- Wrap water pipes in basement or crawl spaces with insulation sleeves to slow heat transfer and consider an insulated blanket for your hot water heater. If you have a fireplace, keep the flue closed when you're not using it.

Yard Preparation Steps

- · Aerate your lawn if the soil is compacted or if thatch is a problem. Apply gypsum and fertilizer to improve soil.
- Plant flowering bulbs and dormant, deciduous trees and shrubs while your garden soil is still soft and pliable. Be sure to allow sufficient space to allow for spring growth.
- Cut the grass one more time to 2-3 inches in height, service your lawn mower and store for winter. Continue to rake fallen leaves and collect in approved paper yard waste bags or in a rigid container clearly marked 'Yard Waste.'
- Yard waste in plastic bags will not be accepted! Yard waste will be collected on residents' regular garbage collection day through December 13.

Residents reminded to clear sidewalks

By City Code, homeowners, renters and businesses are responsible for clearing snow and ice from sidewalks and curb cuts in front of their homes and businesses within a twenty-four (24) consecutive hour time period. Clearing sidewalks is very important to maintain safety for pedestrians, and it is the legal responsibility of homeowners, renters and businesses to keep their premises safe and hazard-free. This includes keeping walkways, driveways, parking lots and other common areas free of ice and snow to prevent accidents and injuries.

This winter, the City of Southfield requests that all residents and businesses make a special effort to clear their sidewalks and apply salt in front of their homes or businesses to ensure a safe route for pedestrians. If your neighbor is elderly or physically incapable of removing the snow from their sidewalks, please consider offering to help. Residents and businesses are encouraged to take the Southfield Safe Sidewalks Pledge and commit to do their part to keep our walkways safe and snow free! Good neighbors make great communities!

Snow Removal Info

The City of Southfield recognizes that dealing with snow and ice covered roads is an inconvenience we all must face. Our road crews do their best to clear the roads as quickly and safely as possible.

We begin by plowing the major roads first, followed by Priority 2 roads (Collector streets) and potentially hazardous locations. Collector streets and potentially hazardous intersections and hills are plowed or salted as required at all storm depths after city major streets are completed followed by all local roads.

DRIVEWAYS & SNOW

Following are some steps that you can take when clearing your driveway to reduce the amount of snow that may get piled as the road is plowed:

If possible, clean driveways and around mailboxes after we have finished plowing the roads.

If this is not possible . . .

- When clearing your driveway, place as much snow as possible in the direction of travel downstream on your side of the road.
- Clear an area upstream from your driveway opening to form a "pocket" for the snow from the road to go into. The result will be that more of the snow from the clearing of the road will go into the open "pocket" area and less will end up in the end of your driveway.

MAILBOX INFORMATION

Snow being discharged from the plow can damage or knock down your mailbox without having any contact from our equipment. It is the City's policy to consider replacing mailboxes only if they are hit by our equipment.
