

Juneteenth Walk Route 2021



Mayor's 5K Juneteenth Walk set for Saturday, June19 at 10am

Rain or shine, the Mayor's 2021 Juneteenth Walk will start and end at the front steps of city hall. No pre-registration is required. Just show up in your walking shoes.

The route goes south on Evergreen for about a quarter mile and then back up to Civic Center Drive; across Civic Center to Northwestern Highway and through the Red Pole Park.

Turning in at Oakland Towne Square, walkers will proceed along the rear drive to Central Park Boulevard and on to Evergreen Road in front of the Travelers Tower Building.

Crossing Evergreen north of the North Roundabout, participants will go to the Reformed Presbyterian (Coventers) Church to view the Underground Railroad marker and then back to city hall.

Southfield Public Library reopens with restrictions, limited hours

While still asking patrons to follow COVID-19 precautions (face masks and social distancing regardless of vaccination status), the Southfield Public Library reopens today.

New hours are Mondays & Wednesdays, 11am to 8pm; Tuesdays & Thursdays, 11am to 5pm; and Saturdays from 11am to 3pm. Closed Fridays and Sundays.

A limited number of computers will be available for 60-minute sessions and librarians will be available to assist patrons.

Termed "Grab & Go," patrons will be able to browse for books, videos and other materials but long stays will not be permitted. Study rooms and tables will not be available, but copy and fax machines and scanning services will be.

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City Council to approve \$185.8 million budget for 2021-22

Southfield continues to be resilient in the face of unprecedented challenges. The slow recovery from the Great Recession and restoration of our tax base, the City's primary source of funding for general operations, continue at a modest pace.

Throughout the ongoing pandemic, the city remains *Southfield Strong* as it continues building a thriving and sustainable community.

The proposed budget represents a modified return to more typical operations from the uncertainty of the past year. Although core operations have continued to function, improvements to the service delivery model are ongoing as the city remains committed to providing a high level of service to residents and stakeholders.

Capital projects that were delayed in the current year have been thoughtfully reassessed and included in the budget, as appropriate. The fundamental message of this proposed budget continues to be sustainability and responsible budgeting to maintain structural balance and live within our means.


The proposed budget is based on available revenues supplemented by a prudent draw on restricted fund balance for sanitation and Metro Act funds. There is no budgeted use of unrestricted fund balance in the General Fund. Total anticipated General Fund revenue of \$81,826,333 is largely supported by property taxes of \$54,292,348 which represent 66% of General Fund revenue.

The tax base of \$2,651,178,080 represents growth of 1.4% over the current fiscal year. Revenue sharing from the State of Michigan, including Local Community Stabilization funds, are anticipated to generate \$8,467,797 or just over 10% of General Fund Revenues.

General Fund expenditures are budgeted at \$81,826,333, largely devoted to personnel cost of \$58,914,355 or 72% of the General Fund expenditures.

Capital Projects within the General Fund total \$2.7 million and include:

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Distribution of Property Tax Dollars - 2021-22

- \$600K for right-of-way improvements utilizing Metro Act funds
- \$650K for a new practical skills training center for the Fire department
- \$200K for a new storage facility for the Fire department
- \$350k for renovations and refinishing at all fire stations
- \$97K for security upgrades for the 46th District Court and Fire stations

Significant capital projects across funds include:

- \$2.2 million in the Library fund for building improvements, equipment, and media
- \$2.4 million in Local Street improvements
- \$16.3 million in Major Street improvements
- \$12.4 million in Water & Sewer infrastructure

The proposed 2021-22 budget for all City funds anticipates balanced revenues & expenditures of \$185,816,809.



Southfield property values inching upward following Great Recession

Southfield property owners are seeing a slow recovery in the worth of their property following the Great Recession (2007-09).

Homeowners with "junk mortgages" found themselves underwater. Foreclosed properties led lenders to "dump" residential and commercial properties at a fraction of their pre-recession value. All of which had a negative impact on the tax bases of municipal governments and property owners.
